Early Identification Makes a Difference

Autism impacts an individual throughout the lifespan. However, research shows that early diagnosis can lead to improved quality of life. For more information on developmental milestones, visit the CDC's "Learn the Signs. Act Early" site.

Here are some signs to look for:

- Repetition in language or movement, Such as repeating the same word or sounds, hand flapping, or any repeated movements
- Atypical nonverbal communication, including avoiding eye contact, giving few facial expressions, or having monotone speech
- Prefers solitary or parallel play rather than engaging in associative or cooperative play with other children
- Extremely distressed by changes, including new foods or changes in schedule
- Preference for predictable, structured play over spontaneous or make-believe play
- Strong, persistent interest on specific topic, part of a toy, or item

Spring Candy Bark



1/2 Pound Butter

1/4 Brown Sugar

1/4 cup Granulated Sugar

1/2 Box Plain Graham Cracker (not crumbs)

2 cups White Chocolate Chips

1 cup Spring M&Ms

Add Spring Sprinkles

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees,
2. Line a 10x 15-line jelly-roll pan with non-stick foil; arrange graham crackers to fit the bottom of the pan in a single layer, breaking up the last few to fit the space.
3. Melt the butter in a medium saucepan over medium heat and add the brown and white sugar.
4. Stir to combine and bring mixture to a boil.
5. Reduce heat and let the mixture gently bubble for 4 minutes and remove from heat.
6. Carefully pour sugar/butter mixture evenly over graham cracker layer., spread to cover.
7. Bake the graham crackers covered in sugar /butter mixture for 10 minutes.
8. Once out of the oven, sprinkle white chocolate chips over the top.
9. Wait about 2 minutes for the chocolate to melt, then use a spatula to gently spread chocolate chips into a even layer on top of the graham crackers.
10. Sprinkle with Spring colored M&Ms and festive Spring sprinkles.
11. Cool to room temperature, then refrigerate for 2 hours.
12. Peel foil from chilled bark and break into pieces.
