Santa Hat Cheesecake Bite

Ingredients

For the crust: 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs 1/4 cup granulated sugar 6 tbsp unsalted butter, melted

For the cheesecake filling: 6 oz cream cheese, softened 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1 tsp vanilla extract 2 large eggs

For the topping: 1 cup fresh strawberries, hulled and halved 1/2 cup whipped cream

Instructions

- Preheat your oven to 325°F and line a mini muffin tin with
- 2. In a medium bowl, mix the graham cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup sugar, and melted butter until combined. Press 1 tbsp of the mixture into the bottom of each liner. Tip: Use the back of a spoon to press the crust down firmly.
- Bake the crusts for 5 minutes, then let them cool slightly.
- 4. In a large bowl, beat the cream cheese, 1/2 cup sugar, and vanilla until smooth. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Tip: Make sure the cream cheese is at room temperature to avoid lumps.
- 5. Pour the cheesecake filling over the crusts, filling each liner almost to the top.
- 6. Bake for 15-20 minutes, or until the centers are just set. Tip: The cheesecakes will firm up as they cool, so don't overbake.
- Let the cheesecakes cool completely, then refrigerate for at
- 8. Before serving, top each cheesecake with a strawberry half and a small dollop of whipped cream to create the Santa hat effect.

Vibrant and festive, these bites are as delicious as they are cute. The creamy cheesecake pairs perfectly with the fresh strawberry, and the whipped cream adds a light, fluffy finish. Try arranging them on a platter with a dusting of powdered sugar for a snowy effect!
